This afternoon students participated in an outdoor liturgy reflecting on this coming Sunday's Gospel reading from Matthew. The following reflection was delivered by Sacred Heart's Catholic Identity Leader, Celeste Oliver.

"My garden is a mess. Last week's gospel talked about how important it is to plant seeds in good soil – and I've done that – but even though my seeds are growing, they are not alone.

Other plants are growing in my garden and I didn't even plant them! There's a name for those plants, they're called weeds.

A weed isn't really a kind of plant – it's just a plant that's growing where you don't want it to. Some of them can be very pretty. But if you have a garden or a flower bed where you've planted things you want to grow, then weeds can be a big problem. Not only do they make things look messy, but they use up the same water and food that your good plants do. So, letting too many weeds hang around can actually make it harder for the things you planted to grow.

In last week's gospel Jesus told us a parable about seeds to teach us a lesson about keeping our hearts and our minds focused on God. He told us that we need to make ourselves "good soil" by really listening to God's word and leading good lives – making good choices.

Here at school we can do this by following the 4 pillars.

In the same way that Jesus was talking about seeds – but really talking about us, this week's story isn't about real weeds in a garden. Jesus is telling us that sometimes it is hard to make good choices.

It would be easy to do all the right things in life if everyone around us was doing them too. But they're not. People lie and steal and fight. They can be greedy and mean and selfish.

People can be weeds. Sometimes we can be weeds. Sometimes they can be doing the wrong things in our lives – our "gardens", as we can in their lives. They set bad examples, or we do and make it just that much harder to for us all to do the right things.

However, despite these pressures, we have to still try harder to do the right thing, even when so many people around us seems to be setting the wrong examples – and pulling us in the wrong direction.

Are you a seed or a weed today, and how can you try again better for tomorrow?

Let's remember that we are only in control of our behaviours and choices, but we can influence other's through the decisions we make. Let us strive to always be **safe, respectful, responsible learners** so that we help ourselves and others to be the best versions of themselves."
